

HEADMASTER'S LETTER No. 155

Dear Old Portorans,

The past year has been a most significant milestone in the history of the school. The Governors' decision to end boarding in June 1994 was a painful one, as it brought to an end a facet of school life which had dominated the character of the school for many generations. Many amongst you will have spent your formative years living as boarders in the school, and most of your memories of the school are dominated by that experience. The end of boarding will sadden you, and I am conscious of a certain kind of light having gone out.

However, being realistic, that light had been dim for a number of years. Rural boarding schools in the United Kingdom have been in decline for some time. In Northern Ireland the strength of the provincial grammar school system has led to the development of very successful grammar schools in every town. The need to send children off to boarding schools for a good education has correspondingly diminished. Portora is very fortunate to have attracted a growing number of day pupils, who have more than compensated for the decline in the number of boarders. The number of pupils in the school is still rising.

To meet this rising demand, and to make our school one that the people of the county can be proud of, the pace of renovation and rebuilding has increased. That is the other way that makes 1994 significant. The whole of the South Wing, from the Seale Room, through to the Stone Hall and the Dining Hall and the floor above, is now as new. The first floor which had the linen room and dormitories, is now a magnificent Library for the whole school, and Reading Room,

with Careers Centre, for the Sixth Form. The basement rooms, below the Stone Hall, offices and Seale Room, are now Common Rooms for the Sixth Form. And, as you move through these areas, you enter the Music suite, which was opened in September 1993.

The old buildings are now in splendid order. To complement this development, the governors have authorised expenditure of over £200,000 for the development of our sporting facilities. Work began during the summer, with the reconstruction of two of the lower rugby fields, and the draining of the outfield of the cricket square.

1994 also saw a continuation of our excellent record of examination results.

These developments are rooting our school ever more firmly in the soil of Co. Fermanagh, and making it the first choice school for many parents. A sign of the County's ever closer identification with the school has been the very successful launch of a Fermanagh branch of the Old Portora Union. It is hoped that even more locally-based Old Boys and Old Girls will become involved in the life of the school. Further evidence of community confidence is the increasing level of sponsorship and support for school activities. An example of this is recent very generous support for the Boat Club by the Killyhevlin Hotel and Belleek Pottery.

All this support, interest and enthusiasm for the school and its development can be summed up by an event here in late September. On a warm, sunny Sunday, with the school and its grounds looking their best, a group of Old Boys gathered for lunch. They had come from England, from Dublin, from Belfast, and from Co. Fermanagh. This event summed up the school, both its past and its present. They gathered in the new Gallery and Reading Room for pre-prandial refreshment, and they dined in the old Dining Hall, under the portraits of King James, and former Headmasters. They represented every generation of Portorans from 1935 to 1994. Eighteen had been boarders; eight had been day boys. They had two things in common that

day — each had been Head of School, and each had bought a chair for the new Reading room. (Many other ex Heads of School had also bought a chair, but had been unable to be present). The younger generation represented the school as it will be; the older generation as it was. But they were united in a unique bond of fellowship.

PORTORA BOAT CLUB 1993-94 Season

The very worthwhile link with St. Michael's College continued and the club again ran the Erne "Head" in March and hosted the Irish Junior Rowing Championships at the regatta early in July.

During the year parents were involved in two fundraising events which raised over £1,000, the Enniskillen Yacht Club Trust made a generous donation, and the two rowing events mentioned above were generously sponsored: to those involved in helping the club in these ways I would like to say "Thank You."

A new trailer was purchased which enables the boats to be transported with greater safety and less risk of damage to the equipment than was the case with the old trailer.

On the water the season proved to be a very successful one. Simon Crawford won the J18 sculls at Queen's, Portadown and Belfast Sprint and was selected to row for Ireland in a double scull at the Coupe de la Jeunesse regatta in Belgium in July.

The Junior 16 squad rowed in eights, fours, quads and a double at heads and regattas and below is a summary of their wins:

Eight: Belfast Sprint, Athlone.

Four: Queen's, Portadown, Belfast Sprint, Bann. Quad: Lagan H.O.R., Newry H.O.R., Galway H.O.R., Portora.

The eight, with five St. Michael's boys in the boat, was Ross Monaghan (Bow), Brian O'Connell, Ronan

McSherry, Paul Masterson, Simon Janes, Connor Kells, David Rogers, Stephen Jackson (stroke) and Gwyn Beattie (cox).

The stern four of the eight made up the four and quadruple scull.

As a result of trials held at Athlone Regatta, Simon Janes and Connor Kells were selected to row in the Irish eight at the home international in London. The whole eight was made up of Junior 16 oarsmen and rowed well, finishing third.

ERNE HEAD OF THE RIVER RACE 5th March, 1994

The race was sponsored by Fisher Engineering of Ballinamallard, and when the results were announced Mr. T. Fisher presented cut glass tankards to the overall fastest crew and pennants to the other class winners.

Seventy five eights and fours entered the race with sixty three of them appearing on the results sheet.



PORTORA REGATTA 1st, 2nd July, 1994

For the second year in succession Portora hosted the Irish Junior Rowing Championships. The course was buoyed and the weather was kind for the two days of the event which was sponsored by the N.I. Tourist Board, Janousek Racing Boats and Fermanagh District Council, Simon Crawford finished fourth in the Championship sculls event while the junior 16 quad won their event and formed half of the Ulster eight which won the junior 16 interprovincial race.

OBITUARIES

J. W. G. BECKETT (U 1927-31), John William George Beckett, one of several Beckett cousins at Portora, performed with distinction at desk, field and ring (and bore for all his days a nose distinctively remodelled at a Portora boxing match). After school he became an underbrewer at Guinness, a career normally parted from only in a hearse, but Hitler took a hand and caused him to arrive in Pretoria, South Africa, in RAF uniform, and to meet Sheila Downes. For the first three years marriage was conducted by mail; the following 47 like marriages ought to be. Home was Johannesburg until he retired as a senior industrial executive: then a beautiful bayside hill near Cape Town, where he spent twenty further years living in practice the kind of life that singers sing and teachers teach. John died in July 1993, leaving Sheila in Gordon's Bay, a son, Denis, in Johannesburg and a daughter, Deidre, in England.

- B. R. COOKE (M 1966-73). Brian Cooke, who was an architectural consultant in Enniskillen, has died suddenly at 40. He leaves his wife and two children.
- MRS. A. GRAHAM. The death has occurred of Mrs. Anne Graham (nee Brittain), widow of Rev. Douglas Graham (Headmaster 1945-53), whom she met when she was a student of modern languages

at Trinity and he was lecturing in classics. She will be remembered as elegant, relaxed and kindly she brought grace and style, as well as humanity, to the headmaster's house.

W. D. KINLEY (L 1943-49). Bill Kinley, who died on July 28, entered Portora in September 1943. The son of a Belfast doctor, he is remembered by his contemporaries as a jovial colleague who from an early stage showed an appreciation of literature. particularly the writing of Wilde and Yeats. He took an active part in school activities and won colours for cricket and rugby. He was appointed School Prefect and Head of House. On leaving school he followed his father's profession, graduating in medicine through Queen's University, and subsequently practised in Belfast. He sent his son David to Portora (L 1972-80). Unfortunately poor health forced Bill's retirement from practice in 1984. He is survived by his wife Suzanne, son David, and daughter Judith.

- DR. G. M. C. McBRIEN (C 1933-37), George McBrien, who was the son of Rev. Canon J. H. McBrien (a member of Dicky Lloyd's team) has died. He used to remember his days at Portora as being mainly cold, hungry and wet! Dr. W. G. (Joe) Speer (U 1942-47), his general practice partner, writes: "George was a most loyal colleague and a good friend, and when I was looking for a job on demobilisation the fact that I had been to Portora clinched the appointment for me as far as George was concerned. He was much loved and admired by his many patients in Bath. His greatest sadness was the sudden death of his younger daughter, Shelagh, at the age of eighteen. She died of a heart condition, and George endowed the "Shelagh McBrien Coronary Care Unit" at the local hospital in her memory. This was one of the first specialist units of its kind in the South-West and is greatly appreciated by the citizens of Bath". George is survived by his wife, Georgina, who is sister of Lt.-Col. Freddie Alston (L 1933-39), and by his daughter Patricia.
- W. H. A. O'DONNELL (C 1936-44). William O'Donnell was born in Fahan, Co. Donegal, where his father, Canon Henry O'Donnell was Rector. At Portora he captained the 1st XV 1943-44, kept wicket for the 1st XI and was a Sergeant n the O.T.C. On leaving Portora he joined James Mackie & Co., trained as a textile engineer and worked for them for over 40 years till his retirement. His memorial address was given by his friend from schooldays, Rt. Rev. S. A. Poyntz, Bishop of Connor (U 1939-44).

DR. D. E. PACKHAM (C 1938-47). Dennis Eadie Packham, who died suddenly on August 31, first came to Gloucester House in September 1938 and left Portora in July 1947. Created a School Prefect in September 1946, he won colours for swimming, athletics and rugby. He was flight sergeant of the ATC under J. Malone.

Dennis went on to Trinity College, Dublin, where he graduated in medicine. After experience at sea with the Blue Funnel Line, and in various hospitals, he settled into general practice in Enniskillen, where he included amongst his patients the boarders at Portora. Dennis Packham was a caring doctor, well known and respected throughout his native Fermanagh. His great hobby was the study of bloodstock breeding and he became something of an authority, contributing articles to such magazines as The British Racehorse. An entertaining character and generous host he is remembered with affection by Portorans of his generation. As an after-dinner speaker he was uproarious and unstoppable, and Masonic dinners will not be the same without him. He was a past president of the Old Portora Union; and is survived by his wife Jane, who as Casualty Sister in the Erne Hospital received the M.B.E. for her part in caring for the casualties of the 1987 Remembrance Day Bomb. - Major P. L. RICE (1932-35 and S 1939-40 and 1946-52). Paddy Rice died from lung cancer on 28 October, 1994. He was Head of History 1946-48, and then Housemaster of Gloucester House 1948-52, when he rejoined the Royal Army Educational Corps.
- P. J. WILSON (U 1968-73). Peter Wilson was tragically killed in a road accident on 7 December, 1994. He succeeded his father, Senator Gordon Wilson, in the family drapery business and later moved into interior design. He was immensely well-liked in Enniskillen, and his death is a further tragedy to the family, following the death of Peter's sister, Marie in the Remembrance Day bombing in 1987. He leaves his wife, Ingrid, and two daughters. His family has had a strong and continuing link with Portora: his father was a governor for many years, and his mother, who still teaches the violin here, is a much-loved presence in school.
- R. WRAY, B.A., LL.B. (M 1927-31). Robin Wray, a well-known figure in legal circles in Northern Ireland, has died. After Portora he took a B.A, at T.C.D. and in 1938 qualified as a solicitor. He was commissioned in the Royal Artillery in 1939, was wounded in the Middle East and ended the war as a Major. He was Coroner of North Antrim for 40 years, a noted golfer (former captain of Royal Portrush) and chairman of the British Legion's N.I. Housing Association. He is survived by his wife, Doreen.

- BUTLER, G. R. (C 1971-78). George Butler is a Chartered Civil Engineer working for Binnie and Partners, a consultant company specialising in the water sector. He also took over command of a Royal Engineer Field Squadron (TA) in May 1994.
- CAREW, G. W. (U 1949-52). Gerald Carew is Technical Manager of the ABP meat plant in Ellesmere, Shropshire. He recently visited Portora with his brother Lionel (U 1949-55), who retired from the Crown Solicitor's Office three years ago.
- CORKEY, J. (M 1982-85). Jonathan Corkey is now employed by Price Waterhouse in Belfast as an IT Trainer.
- DUNLOP, N. J. E. (M 1968-77). Nigel Dunlop lives in Glamorgan with his wife and four children, and works for the cigar division of Gallahers as general manager in charge of manufacturing "Hamlet" cigars. He served with 2nd Goorkhas from 1977-80.
- FOSTER, J. (L 1961-68). John Foster taught in Aberlour House (Gordonstoun Prep School) until 1991, when he became head of Art and housemaster in charge of boarding at the Buchan School (prep school to King William's College), Isle of Man
- GANT, N. J. (U 1956-63). Nicholas Gant, having gained a M.Sc. in 1968, joined an English geological consulting company. For thirteen years he conducted or supervised geophysical surveys in South America, Europe, Africa, the Middle East and Far East. In 1982 he joined Chevron in London, and later transferred to California, where he is still living.
- GASS, Helen B. (H 1982-85). Helen Gass has graduated in Archaeology, and is working to set up a new museum in West Belfast.
- GENTLEMAN, D. R. (L 1937-45). Des and Anne Gentleman, who visited Portora recently, live in an idyllic part of New Zealand, and spend their time fishing, "tramping" and sailing their 22 ft boat. Dr. Henry Jack (L 1938-45), an Old Portora friend, surprised them by appearing at their daughter's wedding, having concealed himself in the village for two days.

THE JOYCE-BECKETT PRIZE 1994

The 1994 Presentation took place in the Ulster Bank Chambers, Dublin, and the adjudicator was Brendan Kennelly, Professor of English at Trinity College.

He started by congratulating Portora and Clongowes on encouraging writing in an age when analysis supersedes imagination. He was delighted to see "the great McCarthy" — the Very Rev. John McCarthy, Dean of Clogher, and a Governor of Portora, who had travelled in support of the Portora team, and who had been at Trinity with him.

He had read all the scripts three or four times, wished he could divide the prize, and had only decided the winner that afternoon.

He read from a collection of poems and an amazing short story "The Coke Can." Their writers were tuned in to violence and reflected it candidly — they were masters of irony, and used it as a mode of revelation.

One story, "Kevin," was about death, and another

An account of "The Wreck of the Tulsa" was undisciplined but vigorous. One poem, "Blatant Injustice," showed very good social feeling, describing the life of the "committed fugitive," Salman Rushdie, and another "Meandering" was an inspiration to take it easy.

Lastly, he came to "A Normal Family," a bitchy but elegant story by Roy Fisher of Portora, to whom he awarded the prize.

He praised the originality of the English teachers in both schools, who clearly saw the dangers of the mechanical, and might even be ahead of "third level in a Kerry Accent," ie his own department.

It was a wonderfully amusing and encouraging talk from one who loves his subject and loses no opportunity to expand on it. After a fine supper it was no surprise to find the great Kennelly and the great McCarthy deeply engrossed head to head, reciting one of Kennelly's poems. Poetry, wine, laughter and youth (for some of us only remembered), and the friendship of two great schools, led by a master of words — it was good to be there.
